




#### THE MAGNA CHARTA



- 1215
- The exorbitant demand for taxes of the King brought to the rebellion of higher classes (barons, merchants)
- It established for the first time the principle that everybody, including the king, was subject to the law
- The king could no longer decide in economic matters alone, but needed the approbation of a «general consent»
- That «general consent» is the first seed that will take the form of a Parliament soon
- Hence, the Magna Charta, which stands at the basis of English constitution, was actually made to defend private property.

Hence, I became stronger and I didn't need the money of Parliament any longer!




As far as I can remember I called Parliament....let me think.....

We were not in speaking terms, actually!!!






I called
